Net Shed Summer 2017

Located at the corner of Bayfield and Collingwood streets is a building over a century old once used to repair fishing nets. It has morphed into a popular venue for book lovers. Each summer hordes of bookworms descend on the weathered shed seeking books for themselves or family and friends.

Operated by the Friends of the Meaford Library since 1994 thanks to the generosity of the McKay family the Net Shed Bookstore has been a destination for local resident and visitor alike. Throughout the summer volunteers receive boxes of donated books which are judged Net Shed suitable (many don't make the cut) with good clean titles organized and shelved for the public. Because of space limitations we cannot accept magazines, old textbooks, computer books and books in poor condition.

Our Net Shed Book Coordinator and the Net Shed volunteers help keep book shelves properly arranged and easy for the public to navigate. Regular culling maintains our inventory fresh especially where best sellers are concerned.

Beginning on the Victoria Day weekend and open each weekend during the summer until Thankgiving the "sale" of gently-read books by free will donation takes place at the Net Shed. A large and eclectic stock of fiction and non-fiction titles provides something for everyone's reading interest.

From Fuller to Foodland®

The Municipality of Meaford and the Meaford Public Library Board have decided to create a larger, updated new library in the former Foodland building at the corner of Sykes and Trowbridge streets. In early 2018 plans for Meaford's new Library will start. After more than 50 years in its current location on Trowbridge Street, the Meaford Public Library will begin to build a new, accessible public building.

Since moving into the former Federal Post Office and Customs House designed by Chief Architect, Thomas W. Fuller and constructed in 1935, the Meaford Public Library has experienced continuous growth over the past decades.

Over the past fifty years, the collection has grown in size: books, CDs, DVDs, audio books demanding more space; and visits to the library have increased. Technology has also expanded with the library use of computers skyrocketing over the past decade. Attendance for adult and children's programming has increased demand dramatically on our public library system.

Our new library will be a modern, larger and accessible building all on one floor. For the first time the public library will have a garden and on-site parking. Stay tuned for more news as the project develops!

Q & A WITH PAST PRESIDENT GILLIAN BIGL

- 4. What challenges do you see for the Friends? Staying autonomous. The Friends of the Meaford Library have always been an independent group of community volunteers not subject to any rules from the Municipality. The large fundraising campaign for the new library building may complicate matters.
- 5. Finally, how would you like your time with the FOML be remembered?

 I would like to be remembered as a team player who was willing to help out where needed. I never intended to be President since I work full-time, but we needed a President in order to retain our charitable status. With others taking on Officer roles, we had a great team, working together and allowing our roles to interplay depending on our skills.
