

Signs announcing Meaford's New Public Library Site

On April 4, 2018, banner signs displaying the site of the new Meaford Public Library were noted by members of the Meaford Public Library Fundraising Committee, Mayor Barb Clumpus, Treasurer Darcy Chapman and Peter Bantock, President of the Friends. Plans for the library at 11 Sykes Street North, formerly the Foodland grocery store are being developed by LGA Architectural Partners.

Fundraising Underway

At their December 7, 2017 meeting, the Friends of the Meaford Library voted unanimously to make a contribution of \$50,000 towards the new Meaford Public Library building project.

The large donation serves to kick off the fundraising campaign and encourage community donations to achieve a new, accessible, modern public library.

Responding to news of this major pledge, Mayor Barb Clumpus commented, "The Friends of the Meaford Library do such a wonderful job supporting Library services in our community. It is so fitting to have them kick off this campaign, and their generous donation and hard work is very much appreciated."

For the last 25 years, the Friends of the Meaford Library (FOML) have supported the Meaford Public Library in a variety of ways. They have donated funds for the library to purchase new books and recently have paid for electronic equipment, digital services such as Hoopla, and generously sponsored author events. FOML are one of only a handful of Library Friends in this area and, during the last 10 years, have contributed over \$100,000 to the Meaford Public Library. With this long record of support of

the Library and the news that Meaford Council had approved the new library, the Friends group agreed it was natural to take a lead role in the Fundraising Campaign for the new library.

FOML will be collecting donations and issuing charitable receipts for donations over \$20.

This exciting new chapter for the library and the community begins with construction estimated to begin in early 2019.




EXECUTIVE BIOS




Leslie Ransom was born and raised in Wawa, Ontario. She joined the Meaford Public Library Board in 2014 as a mem-

New at this year's orientation is training on our pinpad, to be held in the library. The procedure is very simple. It has, for other charities, resulted in as much as a 25% increase in income.

Operated by the Friends of the Meaford Library since 1994 thanks to the generosity of the McKay family the Net Shed Bookstore has been a destination for local resident and visitor alike. Throughout the summer volunteers receive boxes of donated books which are judged Net Shed suitable (many don't make the cut) with good clean titles organized and shelved for the public.

A Fundraising Committee has been created to assist the Municipality in securing community financial support for the development of a new library facility.

The purpose of the Fundraising Committee is to develop a fundraising and sponsorship strategy that aims to raise \$750,000 within the Municipality of Meaford and potentially larger Grey County over a period of 2 years.

From Fuller to Foodland®

The Municipality of Meaford and the Meaford Public Library Board have decided to create a larger, updated new library in the former Foodland building at the corner of Sykes and Trowbridge streets. In early 2018 plans for Meaford's new Library will start. After more than 50 years in its current location on Trowbridge Street, the Meaford Public Library will begin to build a new, accessible public building.

Since moving into the former Federal Post Office and Customs House designed by Chief Architect, Thomas W. Fuller and constructed in 1935, the Meaford Public Library has experienced continuous growth over the past decades.

Over the past fifty years, the collection has grown in size: books, CDs, DVDs, audio books demanding more space; and visits to the library have increased. Technology has also expanded with the library use of computers skyrocketing over the past decade. Attendance for adult and children's programming has increased demand dramatically on our public library system.

Our new library will be a modern, larger and accessible building all on one floor. For the first time the public library will have a garden and on-site parking. Stay tuned for more news as the project develops!
